- A vast and growing collection of letters... EE offers cross-searchable access to over 75,000 letters from 60 critical editions published by leading scholarly and university presses, including Cambridge, Delaware, Duke, Edinburgh, Johns Hopkins, Meiner, Norstedts, Oxford, the Virginia Historical Society and the Voltaire Foundation. Each year, further texts and previously unpublished correspondence will be added to provide a more complete collection online than is possible in print.
- Scholarly technology Editorial expertise is applied as documents are digitized, and
 this intelligence enables the reader to discover new connections between writers and
 recipients. A calendar of all manuscripts enables searches across the letters, archives,
 and collections, and the inclusion of Republican & Julian calendars enables
 searches by various dates in addition to the Gregorian calendar in use today.
- Excellence plus innovation EE combines the best critical editions from leading scholarly presses with more than 200,000 editorial notes that firmly anchor the documents in their historical context. Users can search or browse all fields including author, recipient, date, and location.
- Subject categories Subjects assigned to each letter provide a window on daily life and allow the exploration of the writer's views on history, literature, language, arts, philosophy, science, medicine, and personal, social and political relations.
- Expanding network of links Reciprocal links between *EE* and the *Oxford Dictionary* of *National Biography* expand access to an extended network of respected resources providing the reader with complementary reference materials that provide a more complete picture of the writers and the era.

OXFORD UNIVERSITY PRESS TO BE THE EXCLUSIVE WORLDWIDE DISTRIBUTOR OF ELECTRONIC ENLIGHTENMENT

Oxford University Press (OUP) and the Electronic Enlightenment Project, a research project at the University of Oxford, are pleased to announce that OUP will be the worldwide distributor of *Electronic Enlightenment*, when this new online resource is launched in early 2007.

Electronic Enlightenment (EE) re-creates online the web of correspondence between thinkers and writers of the 18th century. Designed and developed by scholars *for* scholars, *EE* will offer innovative online access to the full critical editions of the letters of more than 3,800 writers including Addison, Bentham, Boswell, Defoe, Hobbes, Hume, Kant, Locke, Pope, Rousseau, Smith, Swift, Sterne and Voltaire.

At launch, the full text of over 60 critical editions of letters published by the world's leading university presses will be fully cross-searchable. Agreements have so far been reached with the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Edinburgh, Duke, Wales, Johns Hopkins and Delaware, as well as Norstedts, Meiner, the Virginia Historical Society and the Voltaire Foundation. Texts from many more academic presses will be included in 2008 and beyond.

The use of 'scholarly technology' reveals important new connections between authors reflecting their ideas on history, literature, language, philosophy, science, medicine, and arts in the era that gave birth to the modern world. Additional indexes synchronize historical calendars, nicknames and pseudonyms, manuscript, archive and editions information.

Invaluable reciprocal links between *EE* and OUP's *Oxford Dictionary of National Biography* will be available at launch. These will demonstrate how *EE* can integrate effectively with respected references in libraries' existing collections, expanding the use and extending the value of these tools as part of a larger network which includes primary source material.
